Local Workforce Investment Area Strategic Five-Year Local Plan

Purpose

- Encourage Local Workforce Investment Areas to develop a plan that aligns the workforce investment system to serve:
 - Employers
 - Job Seekers
 - Workforce and Community Partners
- Effective July 1, 2000 June 30, 2005
- The anticipation of WIA Reauthorization has resulted in LWIBS being directed to only submit Local Plan Modifications



Local Plan Modifications

- Are Local WIB approved and WIA specific technical plans, that updates the Employment Development Department on WIA program activities occurring in local workforce areas
- Extend Local Workforce Investment Area Strategic Five-Year Local Plans and are submitted annually to the Employment Development Department until further notice or until WIA is reauthorized



WIA Funding Streams

Dislocated Worker

- Unemployed and eligible for unemployment insurance benefits
- Self Employed
- Terminated/Laid Off
- Plant Closure or Substantial Layoff
- Displaced Homemaker

Adults

- Over 18 years old
- Low Income Individuals

Youth

- Between 14 and 21 years old
- Barrier to Employment



Formula Funding

Dislocated Worker

PY '10 -11 PY '11-12

\$2,191,302 \$2,132,287 (\$59,000 Decrease)

Adult

PY '10-11 PY '11-12

\$1,942,315 \$1,777,607 (\$164,000 Decrease)

Youth

PY '10-11 PY '11-12

\$1,745,115 \$1,771,113 (\$26,000 Increase)



Modification Highlights

- Changes in Funding for WIA Activities:
 - San Francisco's Dislocated Workers & Adult funding decreased
 - ARRA funding for Adult, Dislocated Worker, and Youth programming expires on June 30, 2011
- Sector Strategies:
 - OEWD implemented three Sector Academies:
 - Construction
 - Healthcare
 - Green
- One Stop Career Link Center Services:
 - A new Chinatown One Stop Career Link Center opened in 2010
 - The Disability Program Navigator and Youth Navigator services will end on June 30th due to budget reductions.
- California New Start Program:
 - A collaborative relationship with the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) to assist parolees with identifying employment services.
