WHEREAS, The San Francisco Human Rights Commission bestowed its inaugural "HERO" Legacy Award to Dr. Jackson in 2012 in recognition of her life-time achievement and outstanding contributions to human rights advocacy; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Jackson was known as "Mother Jackson" in her beloved Bayview Hunters Point and Visitation Valley communities, Dr. Jackson was also a prominent community leader whose wealth of knowledge, wisdom and history motivated other civic leaders to be accountable by challenging them to do the work they were entrusted to perform on behalf of the people of San Francisco: and

WHEREAS, Dr. Jackson served on the San Francisco Redevelopment Joint Housing Committee and continued to fight for affordable housing. Dr. Jackson was instrumental in building the Southeast Community Facility, one of the largest San Francisco City College branches and was committed to the fight for educational and training opportunities for children and adults in District 10: and

WHEREAS, Dr. Jackson was a member of the San Francisco Jewish Committee and the Conference on Religion, Race, and Social Concerns, she conducted outreach work for the senior community and served on the Model Cities Health and Welfare Task Force and helped form the California Association for Health Education Employment and Dignity; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Jackson was born on this day, February 9, 1933, it is with great respect that the San Francisco Human Rights Commission as a part of its regular meeting and in conjunction with Black History Month is proud to honor and acknowledge her legacy; now

Dear Chair Murray and Senator Burr,

I strongly support President Biden's nomination of Julie Su as Deputy Secretary for the United States Department of Labor.

Secretary Su has forged a close partnership with San Francisco during her tenure as California's Labor Secretary. Since the beginning of the health pandemic, she has been instrumental in the State's efforts to deliver supportive services for basic need, providing staff to aid dislocated workers, and assisting us to file nearly 350,000 unemployment claims due to COVID-19, twice the number of claims filed in any prior year in our City's history.

For over 30 years, Secretary Su's work has ensured Californians have strong workplace safety regulations, wage and hour standards, unemployment benefits, workers' compensation, and job training.
