


**Between May 2021 and June 2021,** the total number of jobs in the San Francisco-Redwood City-South San Francisco MD, which includes the counties of San Francisco and San Mateo, increased by 17,200 jobs to total 1,092,000 jobs.

- Leisure and hospitality (up 7,300 jobs) grew the most among the major industries. Three-fourths of the growth was due to food services and drinking places (up 5,600 jobs). Accommodation (up 1,100 jobs) and arts, entertainment, and recreation (up 600 jobs) also improved.
- Professional and business services (up 4,400 jobs), information (up 2,700 jobs), and other services (up 2,500 jobs) all increased employment.
- Financial activities registered a payroll growth of 1,000 jobs. The gain was divided evenly between finance and insurance and real estate and rental and leasing.
- On the other hand, government (down 1,800 jobs) contracted. Due to summer break for students, local and state government educational services (down 2,200 jobs) fell. An increase in local government (up 400 jobs) offset part of the loss.



San Francisco to Require Proof of Vaccination for Entry to Certain Indoor Businesses and All Large Indoor Events


All restaurants, bars, clubs, gyms and large indoor events will be required to obtain proof of vaccination from patrons and employees to protect against the continued spread of COVID-19

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed and Director of Health Dr. Grant Colfax announced today that San Francisco will require businesses in certain high-contact indoor sectors, such as those that serve food or drink like bars, restaurants, clubs, theaters and entertainment venues, as well as indoor gyms and other fitness establishments, to obtain proof of vaccination from their patrons and employees in order for them to go inside those facilities. This does not include individuals ordering or picking up food or drink to go. The Health Order is designed to protect against the continued spread of COVID-19, particularly among the unvaccinated, while keeping businesses open and helping to ensure schools remain open.

Additionally, San Francisco's order creates a new proof of vaccination requirement for large events at indoor venues, requiring attendees who are age 12 or older at events with 1,000 people or more to provide proof of vaccination. Previously, state and local
