Re: AB 593 (Carrillo) – Unemployment insurance: use of information: public workforce development programs -- REQUEST FOR SIGNATURE

Dear Governor Newsom,

I respectfully request your signature on AB 593, which will allow local workforce development boards to better evaluate the long-term impacts of workforce development investments and enable policy makers to ensure that training programs are as effective as possible in delivering family-sustaining career pathways for disadvantaged community members most at risk of being left behind.

Currently, California statute does not expressly permit a local workforce area to access the unemployment insurance data necessary to evaluate workforce outcomes beyond placement if an individual was served by non-federal dollars. This means boards with diverse workforce funding must try to get this data through case worker check-ups, voluntary employer reporting, and time-intensive phone calls, emails and text messages to individual program graduates. For example, our nationally-recognized CityBuild Academy partnership with the building trades, employers, and community-based organizations that you established as mayor of San Francisco is no longer federally funded, but instead, fully supported by local dollars. Therefore, we have no access to the data necessary to evaluate the long-term success of CityBuild graduates or of graduates of our successful new expansion into the commercial driving industry, CityDrive.

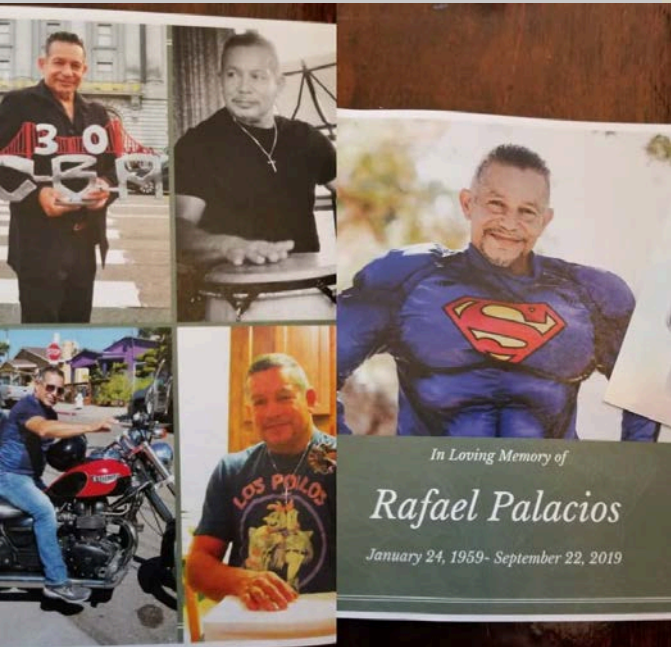

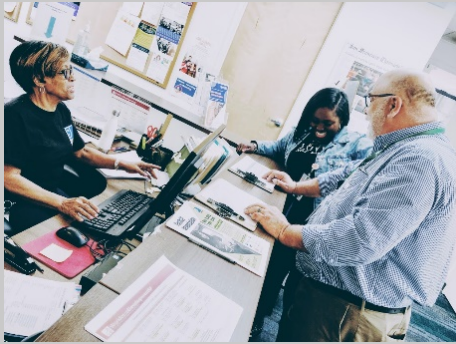

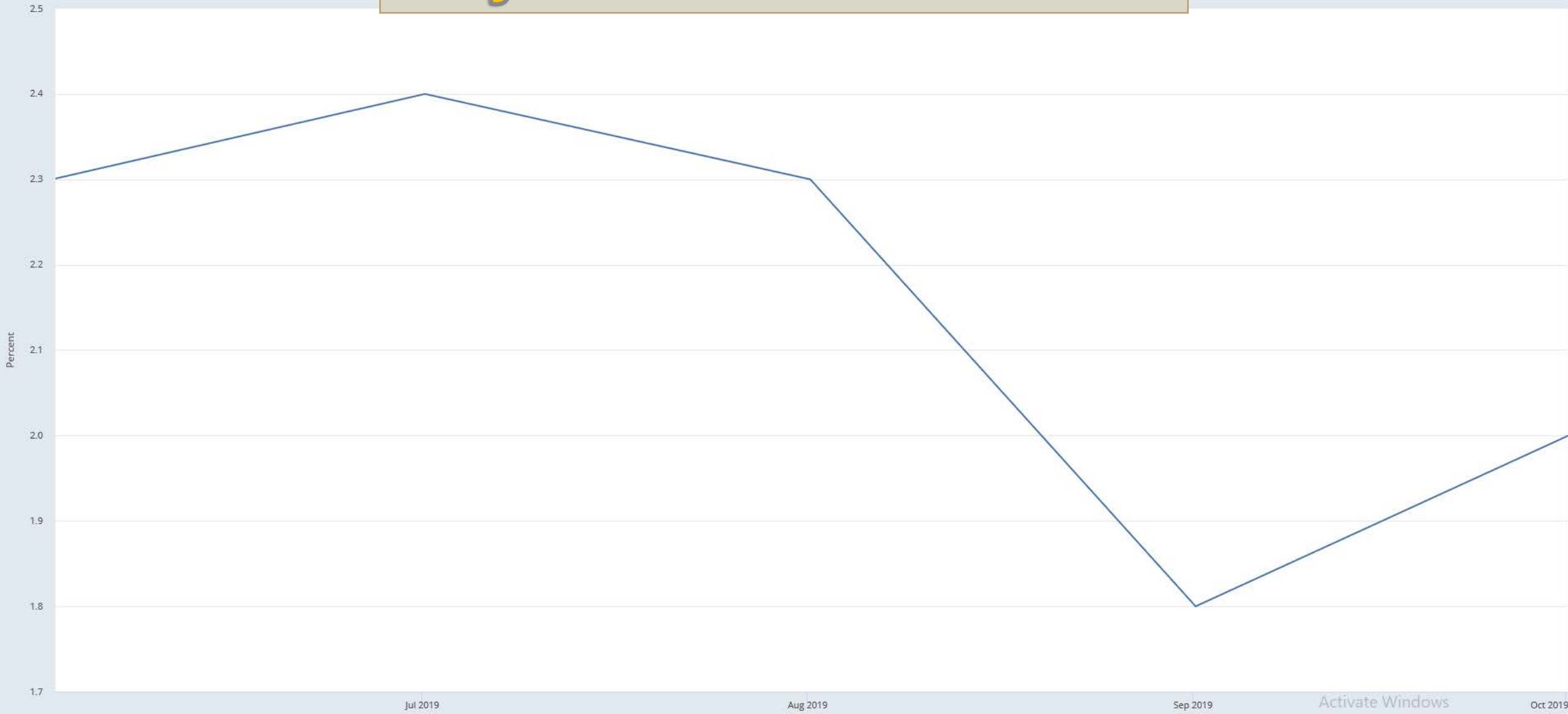

SF Unemployment Rate July 2019 – October 2019





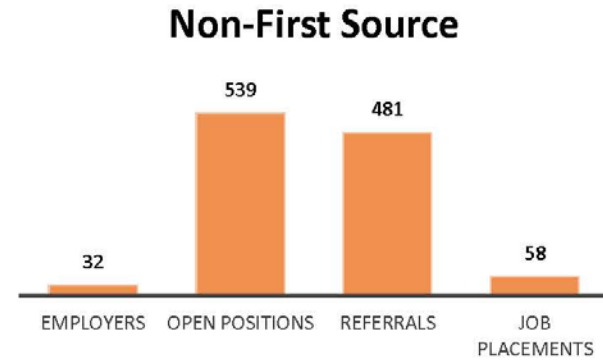
